Workshop: Classroom Critical Thinking, Hospitality and Spaces for Learning

What do critical thinking, a biblical understanding of hospitality, and creation of 'spaces' for learning have in common? And what are they to do with transformational Christian teaching and learning? This workshop engages with such questions and invites you, as a Primary or Secondary teacher, to investigate hospitable teaching ideas for your classroom. Teaching hospitably allows for a particular kind of learning space that intellectually, emotionally and spiritually nurtures students. Workshop: From Frustrating to Flourishing - Supporting Students with ADHD

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is a common condition affecting 5-7% of school-aged children. Whilst much information about ADHD centres on the core symptoms of Inattention, Hyperactivity and Impulsivity, it is also helpful to focus on the Executive Function (EF) impairments typical of the disorder. EF dysfunction has serious implications in the classroom for students with ADHD, as well as their teachers, who can find themselves frustrated by behaviours typical of these students. In addition, most students with ADHD will have at least one coexisting condition that further complicates their ability to learn.

- 2. Describe the everyday manifestations of ADHD:
- a. Students with ADHD have chaotic minds often associated with creativity and brainstorming, entrepreneurial risk-taking and innovation.
- b. However, this creative chaos causes extreme challenges with time management, organisation, prioritisation and motivation.
- c. This second level of performance associated with unfinished projects, missed deadlines and social clumsiness undermines the success of students with ADHD.

Documented Plans are mentioned in federal legislation as important documents for schools to:

- a) Demonstrate evidence of making adjustments, and
- b) Effectively cater for students with disability.

Documented Plans are known by many titles including Individual Education Plans (IEP), Curriculum Adjustment Plans (CAP), Individual Behaviour Plans, Risk Management Plans, Student Health Care Plans, Individual Safety Plans and many more. This presentation will assist schools to better understand how to write effective individual goals for students and how to better manage the overall process of writing, implementing, monitoring and reporting Documented Plans for individual students with disability. It will also directly assist schools, teachers and school leaders to better meet their obligations under the Disability Standards for Education (2005).

This is not just for learning support staff, but for every classroom practitioner who wants to better support students with special learning needs.

Workshop: Teaching Justly for Student Wellbeing

Christian philosopher, Nicholas Wolterstorff contends that education based on a Christian worldview requires teachers to teach justly for just learning outcomes.

In a spiritual context, a conceptual understanding of justice reveals the character of God, the heart of God, and every aspect of good purpose in human relationships. Justice is a spiritual concern. In knowing God we understand that doing 'good' is a requirement of an authentic reflection of the nature of God, who is good. One outcome of doing 'good' is to assist one another to flourish (Price, 2016, p.138-139). This workshop invites teachers to delve into conceptual understandings of justice, and to plan for ways in which they may teach justly to enable their students to flourish.

Workshop: Christian understandings of entrenched ways of life
