- All entries are reviewed by our team of qualified markers
- All entrants will receive a certificate of participation

SCHOOL AWARDS

- Most Engaged School The school that submits the most entries in 2020 will receive a free two-day civics education workshop, delivered on-site at the winning school by the Whitlam Institute Civics Education Officer.
- WestWords Author Visit One participating school will be given the opportunity to host an author at their school thanks to WestWords.

OVERALL WINNER

The Overall Competition Winner will receive

ARTISTIC MERIT AWARD
