INCLUSIVE EDUCATION



Disability Royal Commission

The Australian and Western Australian Governments have released their responses to the Disability Royal Commission with several references to schooling.

Through the initial response to the Disability Royal Commission, the Australian Government is investing in a range of initiatives to better support inclusion and access, recognising the diverse and intersectional experiences of people with disability and their carers at all life stages.

These initiatives include:

 Working with state and territory governments in partnership with people with disability to help educators, schools and school systems deliver more inclusive education to improve outcomes for school students with disability.

Our existing work goes beyond the Disability Royal Commission's recommendations, including:

• In education, the Australian Government is providing an estimated \$3.7 billion in 2024 to support schools to implement reasonable adjustments through the Schooling Resource Standard students with disability loading. The Department of Education will also commence work to inform national system reforms to drive more accessible and inclusive school education and improve outcomes for students with disabilities. To complement this, the Government produces resources to support students, parents, and carers to understand their rights; and support school staff to understand their obligations. The Government also supports professional development for school staff to build skills and understanding around autism through the Positive Partnerships Program; and provides funding through the Higher Education Disability Support Program to assist universities to support students with disability.

Volume 7 considers the experiences of people with disability in accessing inclusive education, employment and housing. It includes 44 recommendations, 35 of which are within the Australian Government's primary or shared responsibility. The Australian Government:

- Notes recommendations 7.14 and 7.15 around the phasing out of segregated education. The
 Australian Government recognises the ongoing role of specialist settings in service provision for
 students with disability and providing choice for students with disability and their families. State and
 territory governments will continue to be responsible for making decisions about registration of
 schools in their jurisdictions.
- Working with state and territory governments in partnership with people with disability to help educators, schools and school systems deliver more inclusive education to improve outcomes for school students with disability.

These responses are the first stage of a broader program of reform to address the Disability Royal Commission's recommendations alongside related disability reforms.

Bullying No Way: National week of action

Marking Bullying No Way: National week of action (12-16 August), eSafety has launched new resources designed in collaboration with child wellbeing expert and NSW Chief Behaviour Advisor, Professor Donna Cross.

<u>Spotlight on Cyberbullying</u> is designed to further boost resilience among families and schools.

Spotlight on Cyberbullying promotes a whole-school approach, offering tailored resources for principals, educators, parents, and children.

Educators can access teaching and learning activities and professional development resources to integrate cyberbullying awareness into online safety education programs and curriculum.

Parents and carers can benefit from practical advice on monitoring and supporting their children's online activities.

Children can access interactive content to learn about online safety and how to report incidents.

Linked to the National Week, eSafety is hosting a range of events all throughout August, including <u>Virtual</u> Classrooms for primary students, teacher professional learning and parent/carer webinars.



TalkNow Evaluation

Researchers from Curtin University have been appointed to externally evaluate the impact of the <u>TalkNow!</u> Respectful Relationships Programs. Any school site who agrees to trial the program during 2025 will be asked to support the following activities:

- Teaching staff who will be responsible for delivering the lessons/topics will participate in two 60-minute focus group discussions during the year (Term 1 and Term 4)
- A Curtin researcher will visit each school site and take observational notes whilst 2 lessons (different topics) are being delivered
- A group of parents from the school will participate in a 60-minute focus group discussion (Term 4)

All activities will be reviewed and approved by a Human Research Ethics Committee before they commence. Schools and individuals will not be identified in any final reports without permission.
