**Ombudsman Conversation** 

After much feedback this year relating to the Reportable Conduct Scheme, I joined Lynne Nixon (Child Safety Consultant), Nigel Briggs (Industrial and Workplace Relations Consultant, and Adrian Scott (Registration and Compliance Consultant) for a face-to-face conversation with the Ombudsman. We shared key points including concerns about increased workloads, multiple reporting processes, and lack of clarity in Reportable Conduct procedures.

The Ombudsman highlighted procedural fairness as a key issue and noted current work being conducted in an attempt to streamline information sharing between agencies.

During this meeting, the Ombudsman announced the release of new templates, now available on their website. These are:

- Investigation Plan
- Investigation Report
- Letter of Allegation
- Letter of Proposed Adverse Findings and Actions
- Outcome letter

These documents are listed under templates on the Reportable Conduct Ombudsman website. The Ombudsman are also planning to have practical workshops about how to run an investigation available next year with an Albany workshop this December. I am currently liaising with an Albany independent member school to explore hosting this event. I may reach out to other members schools with a similar request as the dates for further workshops become available.

# **AISWA School Programs and Services Team Explores Kimberley Schools**

After months of anticipation and preparation, I embarked on a journey to the Kimberley with members of the AISWA School Programs and Services Directorate: Nigel Briggs (Industrial and Workplace Relations Consultant), Amanda Fernihough (Inclusive Education Manager), and Adrian Scott (Registration and Compliance Consultant).

Our week-long trip began in Kununurra. The heart of our journey was connecting with AISWA member schools and Independent Aboriginal Community Schools (AICS) in the region. Our first visit was to Alta-1 Kununurra, where Principal Karlee Brown warmly welcomed us and shared her insights about the school. Here we also met Andy, the resident horse trainer, who not only provides emotional support to the students through his work with the horses but also shared fascinating local knowledge.

Our next stop was Purnululu Community School, where, despite a detour and a chipped windscreen, we were greeted by Acting Principal Tammy Cowan. The school came alive with the sounds of children playing basketball in the sweltering heat, and we were captivated by the incredible First Nations murals adorning the school walls.

At Yiyili Community School, after a challenging off-road drive, we marvelled at the beautiful community art and delved into the school's history, guided by Shaun, Chair of the Yiyili School Board.

Navigating the Kimberley presented its challenges—Google Maps led us astray more than once! However, with the help of Principal Christine Berberich at Kulkarriya Community School, we eventually found our way. Christine's first piece of advice was, "Never follow Google!" She generously shared the story of her school and community with us—a true gift.

Christine then accompanied us to Wulungarra Community School to ensure we didn't get lost again. There, we met Principal Rosie Visiya, whose dedication as both Principal and community leader was awe-inspiring. It became clear that leading a school in the Kimberley is a vastly different experience from leading one in the metropolitan area.

Our final school visits were to Yiramalay Community School and Nyikina Mangala Community School. At Yiramalay, Principal Adele Gott welcomed us warmly, and we enjoyed seeing the students' bond with Nigel over football.

Nyikina Mangala Community School is set against the stunning Leopold Ranges. Despite the quietness due to sorry business, the resilience and beauty of the community shone through as we spoke with Principal Wikitoria Bacon.

Throughout our visit to seven AISWA Independent Kimberley Schools, we were privileged to learn from and offer support to these dedicated leaders. Our relationships with these schools were strengthened, and our understanding of their unique contexts, challenges, and celebrations deepened. The lessons learned and connections made during this trip will stay with us long after the dust settles.

Special thanks to the leaders in each school for your warm welcome and willingness to teach us about each of your contexts.

To all students entering exam season in the coming weeks, especially our resilient Year 12 boarding students who have pursued their studies away from home—your hard work is about to pay off, and a bright future is just around the corner.

<u>Creativity for Schools</u> connects Western Australian creatives with schools to embed creativity into students' learning and understanding.

The Collaboration category offers funding for up to \$60,000 and supports activities for students (K to 12) utilising arts-based practice to engage them in their learning.

# **Curtin University – Education Advisory Board**



Throughout the year, after many conversations with our members schools including the WA Collegiate Schools, CARE schools, regional and remote leaders, there have been requests for AISWA's assistance to work with universities to support the placement of teaching practicum students in schools. The feeling is that incoming teachers with experience in a wide range of schools will be better equipped when stepping into their own classrooms for the first time.

This message was shared at the Curtin University Education Advisory Board meeting. Curtin University is very interested in connecting with AISWA schools open to hosting practicum students. For remote and regional schools, the

ability to house the student/s is a factor which needs to be considered by interested schools.

Below is an outline of the critical placements for the remainder of 2024.

Both groups of students will be completing their 3rd placement:

- Master of Teaching 28 Oct 15 Nov (3 week placement) Year 1-2 classroom required
- Graduate Diploma in Education 28 Oct 22 Nov (4 week placement) Year 1-6 classroom required

Teachers who mentor students will be remunerated at \$25 per day (\$375 for a 3 week placement, \$500 for a 4 week placement).

Curtin is open to facilitating practicum student experiences in remote and regional areas especially if accommodation is available.

If you are keen to host some Curtin practicum students, please contact <u>Melissa</u> Brodie to start this valuable conversation.

For schools that are finding staffing challenging this could offer a valuable pipeline to some up-and-coming talent!
