

# Mid Term Camp



We participated in a very challenging assault course at XLR8 in Baldivis, which wore our bodies down but built our confidence up. Everyone enjoyed the activity.


Unfortunately we did not "catch 'em all' but we did manage to get a few Pokemon at Fremantle while enjoying our fish n chips.






#### Scotch College Sand Art Project


