Students will attend a high school in Japan whilst living with volunteer Japanese families. Scholarships, currently valued at approximately \$2000, are available to outstanding applicants.

The Dunlop Asia Fellowships provide opportunities for young Australians who are committed to making a lasting contribution to Australia-Asia relations.

Fellowships provide a grant of up to \$15,000 for an individually devised program in an Asian country in fields including, but not limited to: social service; local community development; regional organisation building; peace-keeping; public health/welfare; technology; environment; arts/culture; and sport.

The Darmasiswa Program (18+)

The Darmasiswa program aims to foster interest in Indonesia's language, culture and arts. Funded by the Indonesian government, several scholarships are offered annually to Australians wishing to undertake one year non-degree programs in Indonesia. Applications are due in November each year for studies in August/September the following year.

Australia-Indonesia Youth Exchange Programme

A group of 14 Indonesian and 14 Australian youth represent their countries in this well-established short-term exchange program. Participants are chosen from applicants undertaking tertiary studies or employed in any one or more of the areas: Agriculture, Arts, Music, Asian Studies, Economics, Business, International Relations, Education, Engineering, Science, Environmental Management, Journalism, Media, Information and Communications Technology, Law, Health, Politics, Sports, Tourism and Hospitality. All expenses are paid.

China Study Tour by the Confucius Institute (18+)

The China Study Tour is an intensive nine-week course of study in Chinese language, culture and society that includes eight weeks of classes and one week of independent travel. The study tour is open to participants aged over 18, whose Chinese Mandarin language skills range from beginners to native speakers. The program is split between Zhejiang University (ZJU) in beautiful Hangzhou and the Beijing Institute of Education (BIE) in historic Beijing.

Australian Youth Ambassadors for Development (AYAD) (18+)
