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Future Footprints went to St Hilda's in Week 9 of Term 2 to create a sand mural with the Aboriginal students and the RAP committee students. Lesley and Imogen came up with the design for the mural, and explained the story behind it:

The school shield in the middle represent the school, with the four houses being represented by:

- DeGrey a campsite
- Gascoyne a campsite
- Blackwood a water hole
- Fitzroy a water hole

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There are footprints, lizard tracks, emu tracks, kangaroo tracks and snake tracks going from the water holes to the campsites.

These tracks represent the connections, transition and endurance that students go through when leaving their homes to come to St Hilda's.

The women sitting around the campsites represent the friendships made.

An assembly followed the sand mural on Friday with the Year 7 and 8's in person and livestreamed to the rest of the school. The chorale performed a beautiful rendition of We Are Australian with the first verse in Yawuru language.

Perth College Reconciliation Action Plan

Perth College has been working hard on updating their Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). The RAP committee is made up of Perth College students and staff. The committee was very happy to put together an incredibly powerful vision statement.
